They ask questions beginning with **who**, **what**, **where**, **when**, **why**, **how many**, **how often**, and **how**. They also ask **yes/no questions**. And of course, depending on the flow of the interview, they need to be ready to *adjust* their questions, and to ask *follow-up* questions.
