- 4. Why is it important for Jii-chan to tell Kenta the story of the "Thirty-seven Ishiguros"?
- 5. Explain the nature of Kenta's communication with his Uncle Hiro.
- 6. How does the photograph mentioned in Chapter 7 help explain what Kenta imagines Jii-chan is imagining in Chapter 1?

#### **Topic for Writing**

Kenta has great memories of the time he spent with his grandfather. What special memories do you have of the time you spent with an older relative—maybe a grandparent, maybe an aunt or an uncle. Write an essay describing your experience. Focus on one incident, or on many, as you like.

How important is it to grasp the nuances of history (whether personal or global)—and how difficult is it to discuss that history with others?
